



Taiwan's Education System

In Taiwan, students can pursue higher learning at two-year and four-year colleges and universities. As in many other countries, university undergraduate programs usually require four years of study; graduate programs leading to a master's degree require 1~4 years; and doctorate programs require 2~7 years. Some programs require an internship from 6 months to 2 years.

Expenses to Study in Taiwan

Taiwan is well-known as a country where you enjoy high quality education and modern living at affordable costs. Typical costs for Studying in Taiwan are set out below:

Tuition and miscellaneous academic fees

around US\$ 1,500 ~ 1,800 per semester for a bachelor's degree program. Tuition is around US\$ 1,600 ~ 2,000 per semester for a master's degree or PhD program.

Meals

US\$ 180~270 per month

Accommodation

1. On campus:

around US\$ 20~100 per month (depending on the individual university, and type of room)

2. Off campus:

around US\$ 200~600 per month (not including utilities)



Top 6 Reasons for Studying in Taiwan

High quality learning environment

Taiwan is a modern, free, democratic society. Its outstanding higher education system provides opportunities for international students to study a wide variety of courses and programs, ranging from the Chinese language and history to tropical agriculture and forestry, international business, semi-conductors, genetic engineering, and more. Chinese culture holds education and scholarship in high regard, and nowhere is this truer than in Taiwan. You can experience a vibrant, modern society rooted in one of world's most venerable cultures, and populated by some of the most friendly and hospitable people on the planet.

There are approximately 160 higher education institutions in Taiwan. 86% of the professors at public universities and 67% of professors at private universities have a PhD, and many have studied overseas themselves. More and more universities now offer individual courses and even full programs that are fully taught in English, particularly for higher degrees, and many engineering and business programs have been accredited by IEET and AACSB respectively.

A repository of Chinese culture

While eagerly embracing the future, the people of Taiwan hold onto traditional Chinese values and ideals. Traditional forms of writing, architecture, and art, festivals and associated customs are all an integral part of everyday life. The ancient and modern, traditional and new are seamlessly woven together in Taiwan, creating a fascinating, dynamic society like no other in the world. The National Palace Museum collections span the history of Chinese civilization and draw visitors from around the globe.

A perfect place to learn Chinese

Mandarin Chinese is the official language of Taiwan. Immersing yourself in the modern, Chinese-speaking society of Taiwan is an ideal way to learn Chinese. Taiwan uses the traditional Chinese characters (some places use modified forms of several hundred). It's essential for anyone who wants to be a translator or read historical (pre 1950s) material to learn them and this is the perfect place. There are Chinese Learning Centers in universities located all around Taiwan, so you can choose an area you'd like to explore as you study. The Chinese Learning Centers all provide high quality teachers and facilities, and a variety of courses to help students of all levels of proficiency achieve their goals. Best of all, outside of class, you'll have innumerable opportunities to practice reading Chinese characters and speaking Mandarin with Taiwan's friendly people. You'll quickly enjoy an ongoing sense of accomplishment as you communicate in Chinese.

Test of Chinese as a Foreign Language (TOCFL)

Take advantage of the opportunity to sit for the TOCFL test to assess your progress. TOCFL is a standardized language proficiency test that was developed in Taiwan for non-native speakers of Chinese.

"Friendly", "safe", "modern", "convenient", and "dynamic" are words commonly used by international friends to describe Taiwan. Living in Taiwan is easy and affordable - you can find convenience stores open 24 hours everywhere - and Taiwan's medical and health facilities are world class.

All of China's regional culinary styles are available to be enjoyed, including those of Beijing, Tianjin, and Shandong in the north, and those of Sichuan, Hunan, Jiangsu, Zhejiang, Guangdong, and of course, Taiwan itself further south. And you can find restaurants that serve the cuisines of countries all over the world.

Taiwan is readily accessible from Hong Kong, India, Japan, mainland China, Malaysia, the Philippines, Singapore, Thailand, and Vietnam. And transportation in Taiwan is just as easy. Major cities have superb public transport, taxis, and now You-bikes (a public bicycle sharing service) you can whiz around on, and you can travel from Taipei in the north to the city of Kaohsiung on Taiwan's southern tip in just two hours on Taiwan's High Speed Rail.

TEEP - Gateway to Asia Exploration

The Taiwan Experience Education Programs (TEEP) is a new Ministry of Education initiative launched in 2015. International students can take one of a number of short-term programs that combine short courses, Chinese language-learning, and an internship. The practical focus depends on which university is offering their program: for example, International Consulting, Electrical Engineering or Computer Science, Culture Studies, and Taiwan's Natural Environment.
